Things to Know

This Data Report is a comprehensive data report on available data for a variety of aspects regarding Washtenaw County’s youth well-being. It should be assumed the data is regarding Washtenaw County, unless stated otherwise.

Indicators such as,    , will be utilized to display **negative** or **positive** increasing or decreasing trends when applicable. Trends are based on statistics available from the previous 5 years (since the pandemic).

Disparities between minority groups of students and other students are addressed as ‘gaps’.

- **Students with disabilities** refers to a student with one or more specific impairments that require special education or related services and who have an Individual Education Plan.
- **Economical Disadvantaged (ED)** refers to students who qualify for free and reduced lunch.

Certain graphs utilize raw data to not mask disparities, so line marker charts are utilized to compare each race/ethnicity data series to the overall middle school or high school series.

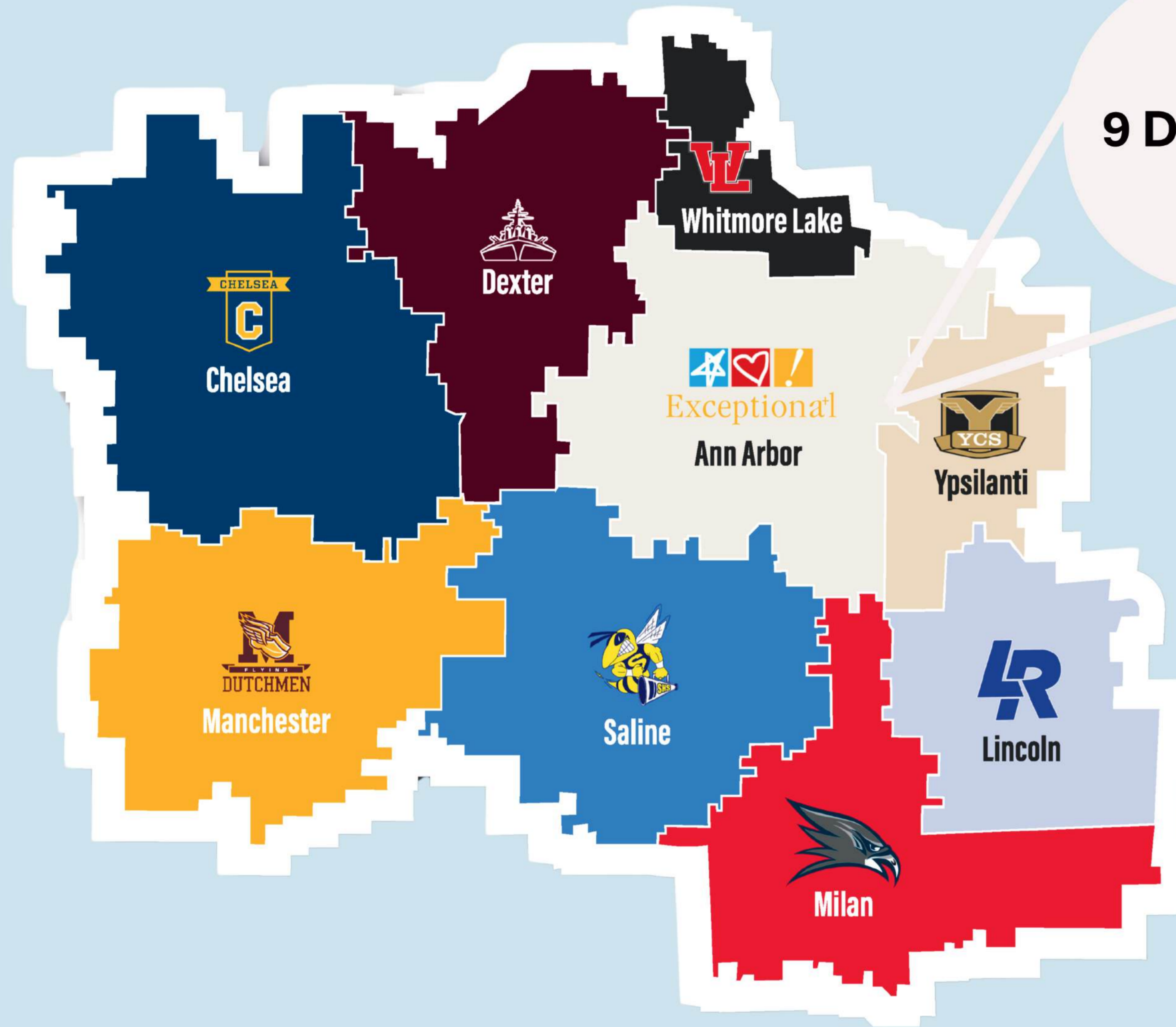

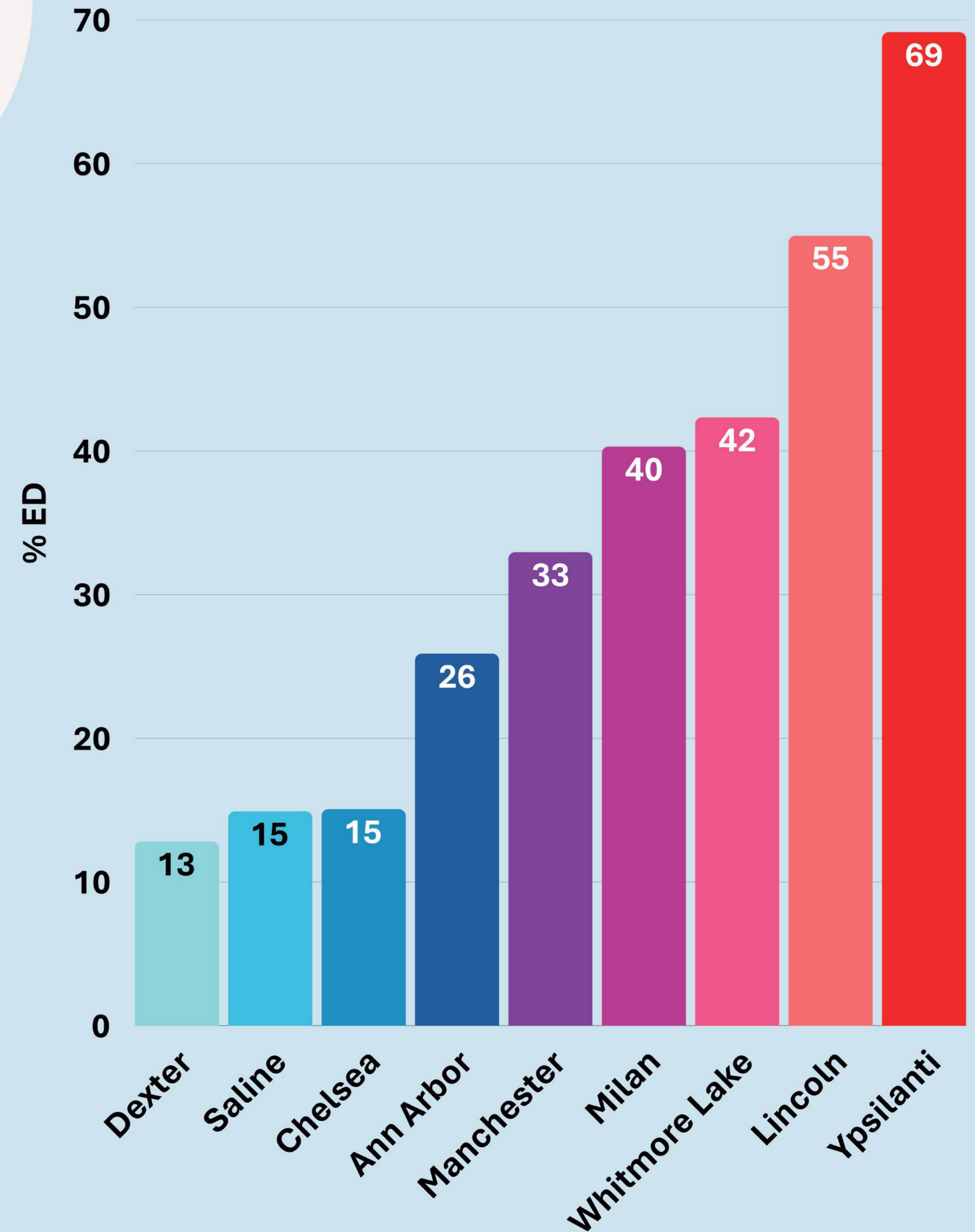

Moving forward ALICE Households: Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed may be a better indicator compared to ED (Economically Disadvantaged). **As of 2022, 39% of Washtenaw households live below the ALICE threshold, 13.3% of which are below the poverty line. All ED students fall within ALICE.**

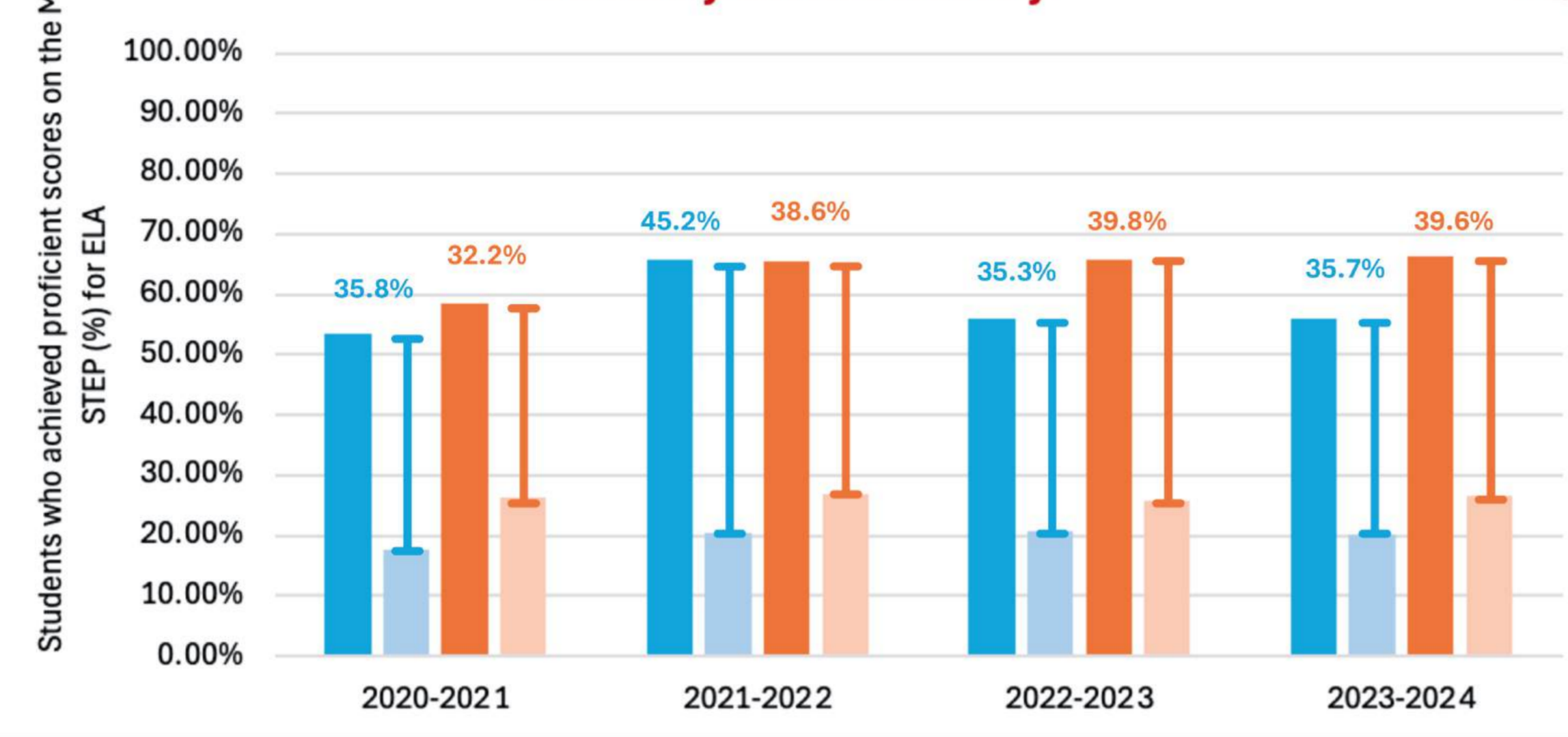

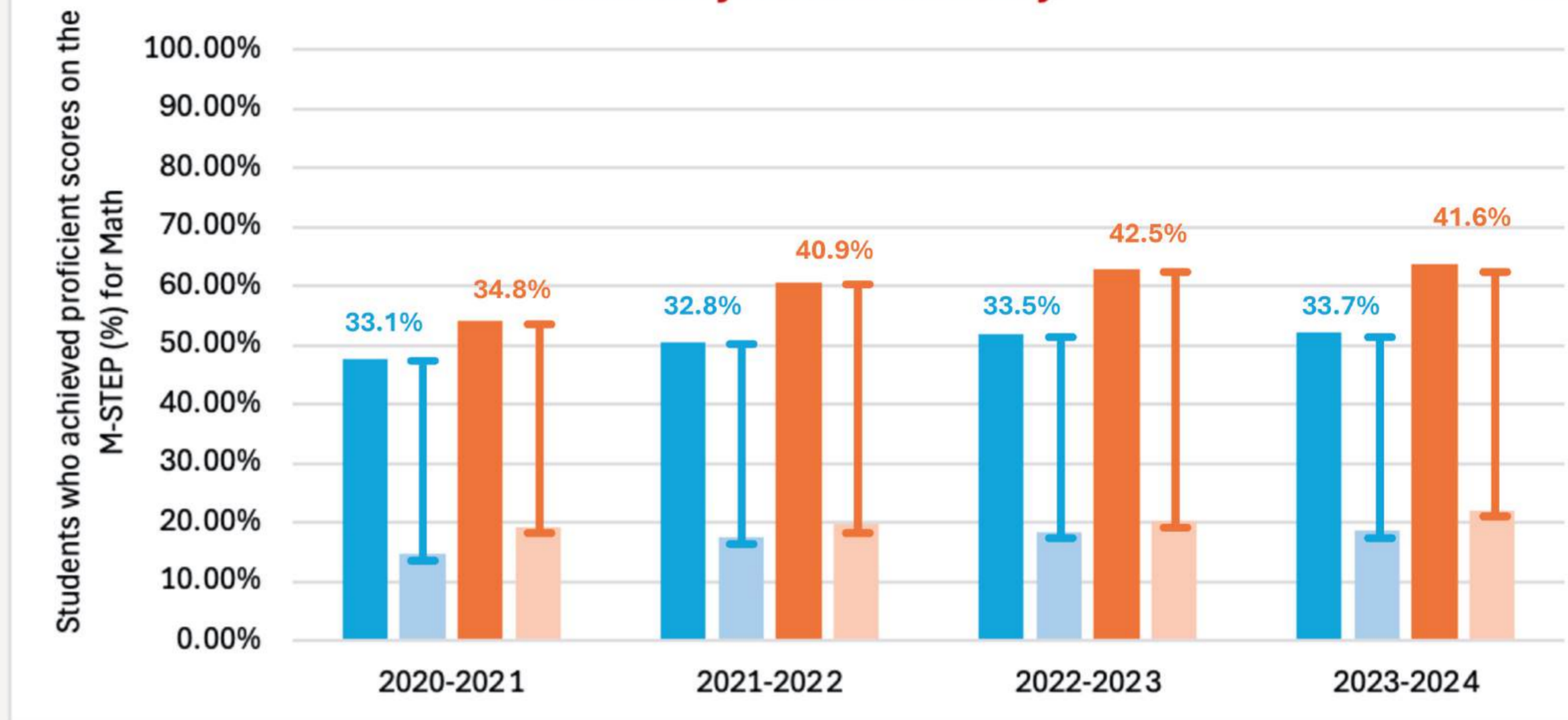

3 ELA M-Step Proficiency: **Gaps Increasing for ED & Non-ED, & With Disability & Non-Disability**

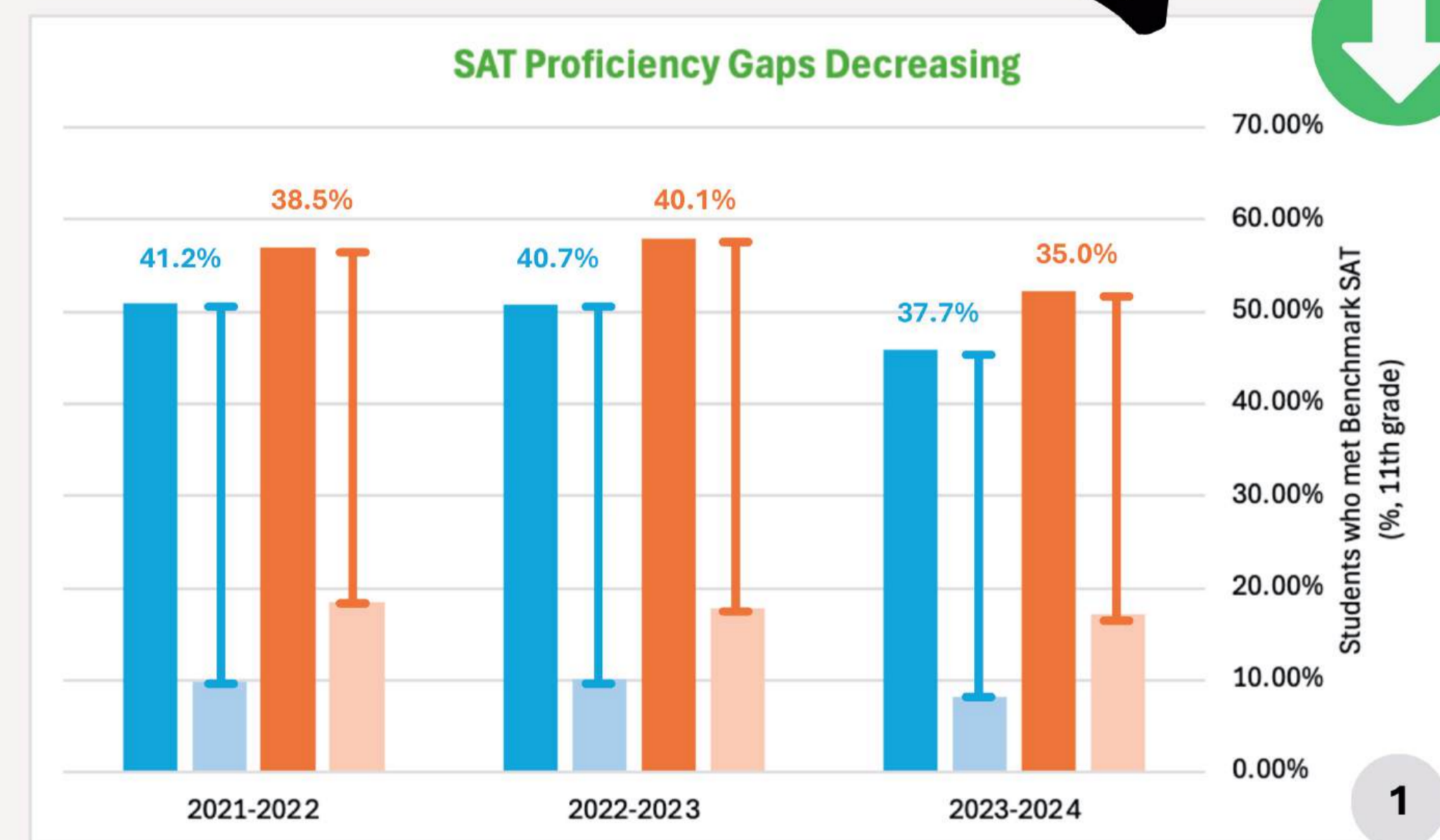


3 Math M-Step Proficiency: **Gaps Increasing for ED & Non-ED, & With Disability & Non-Disability**



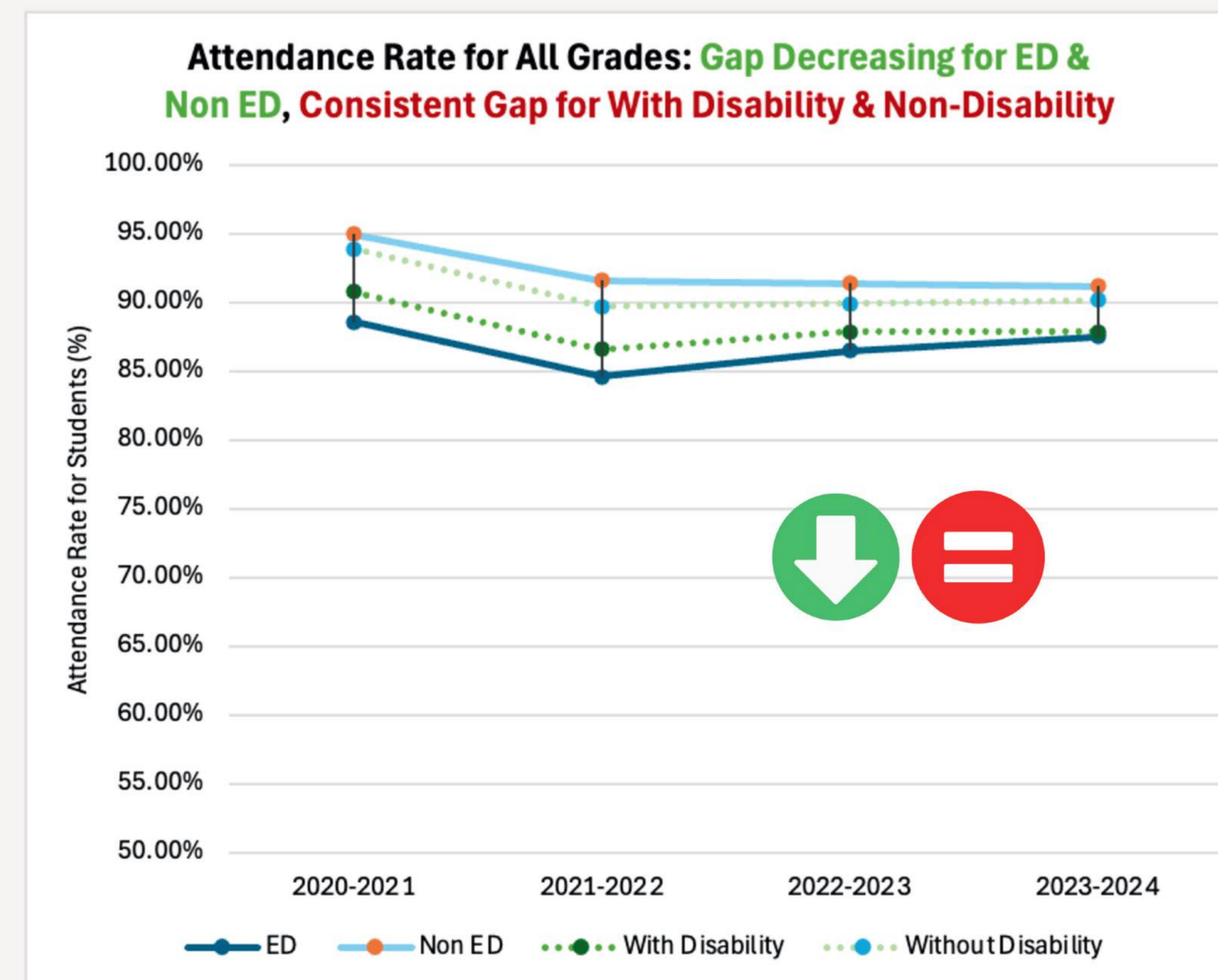
SAT Scores

SAT Proficiency Gaps Decreasing

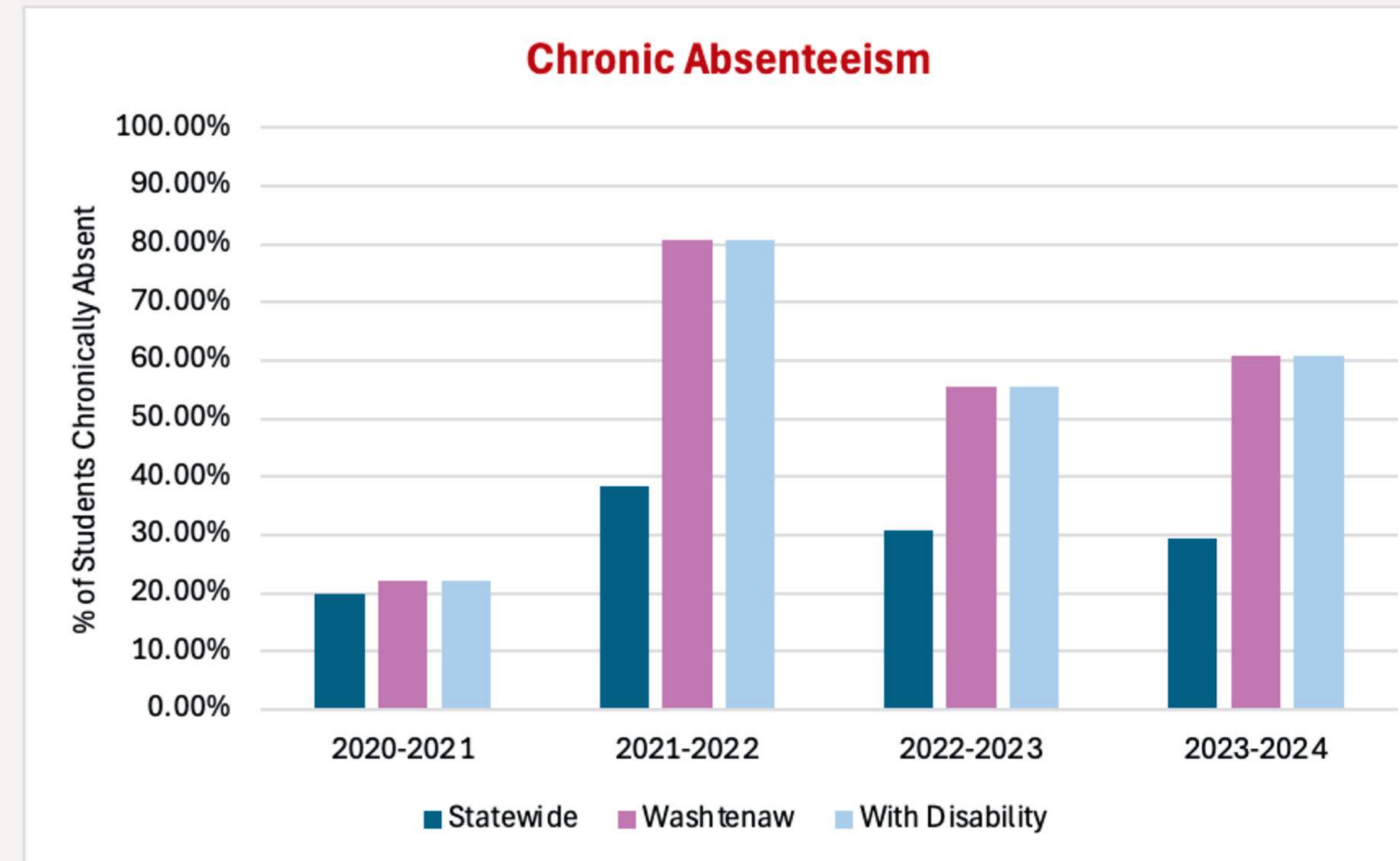

Attendance Rate for All Grades: **Gap Decreasing for ED & Non ED, Consistent Gap for With Disability & Non-Disability**



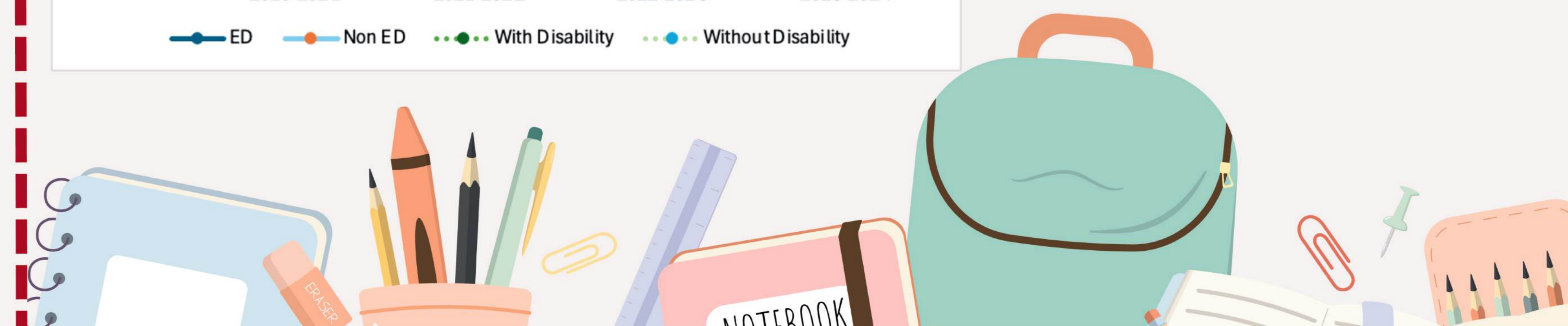
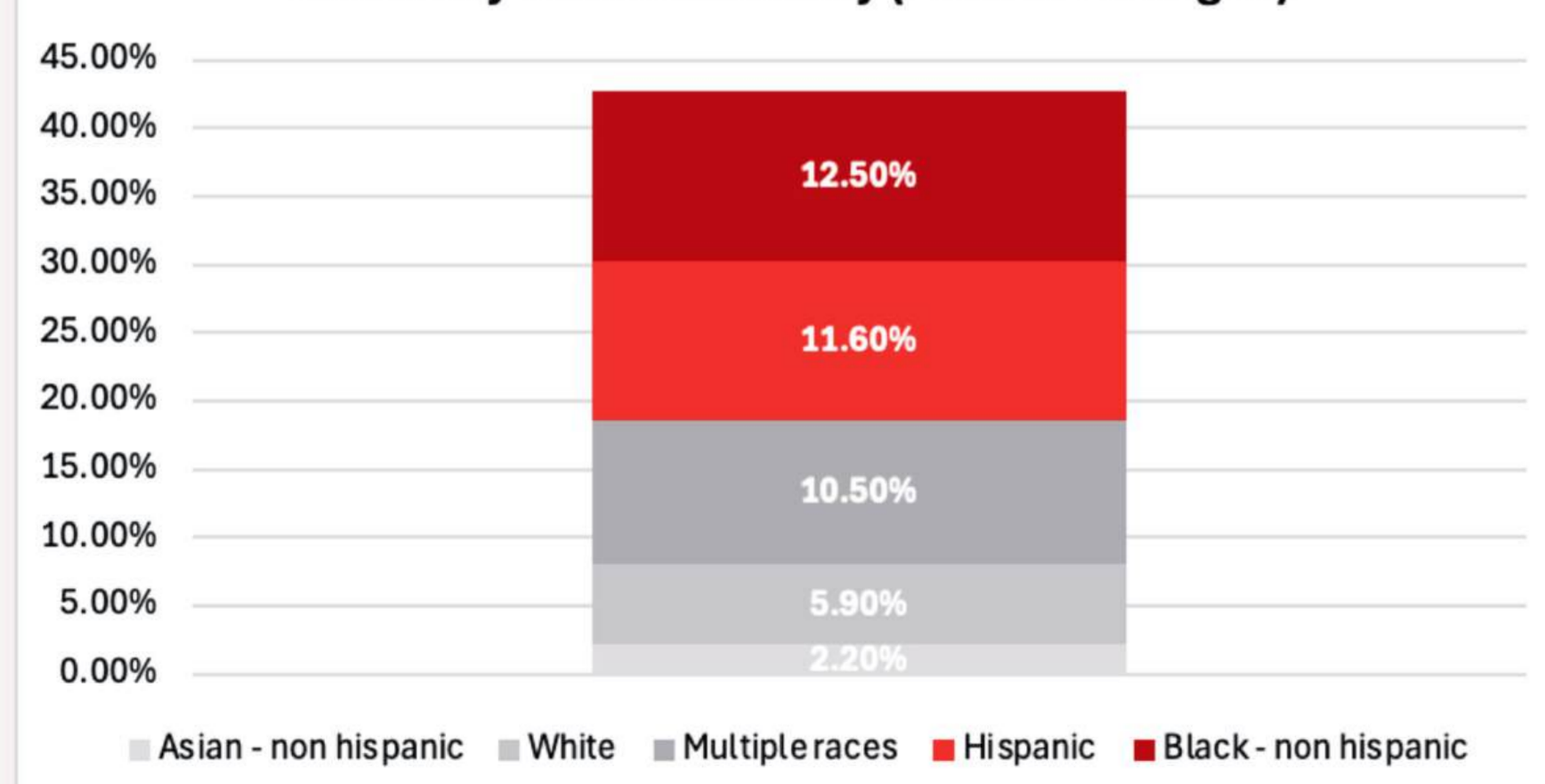

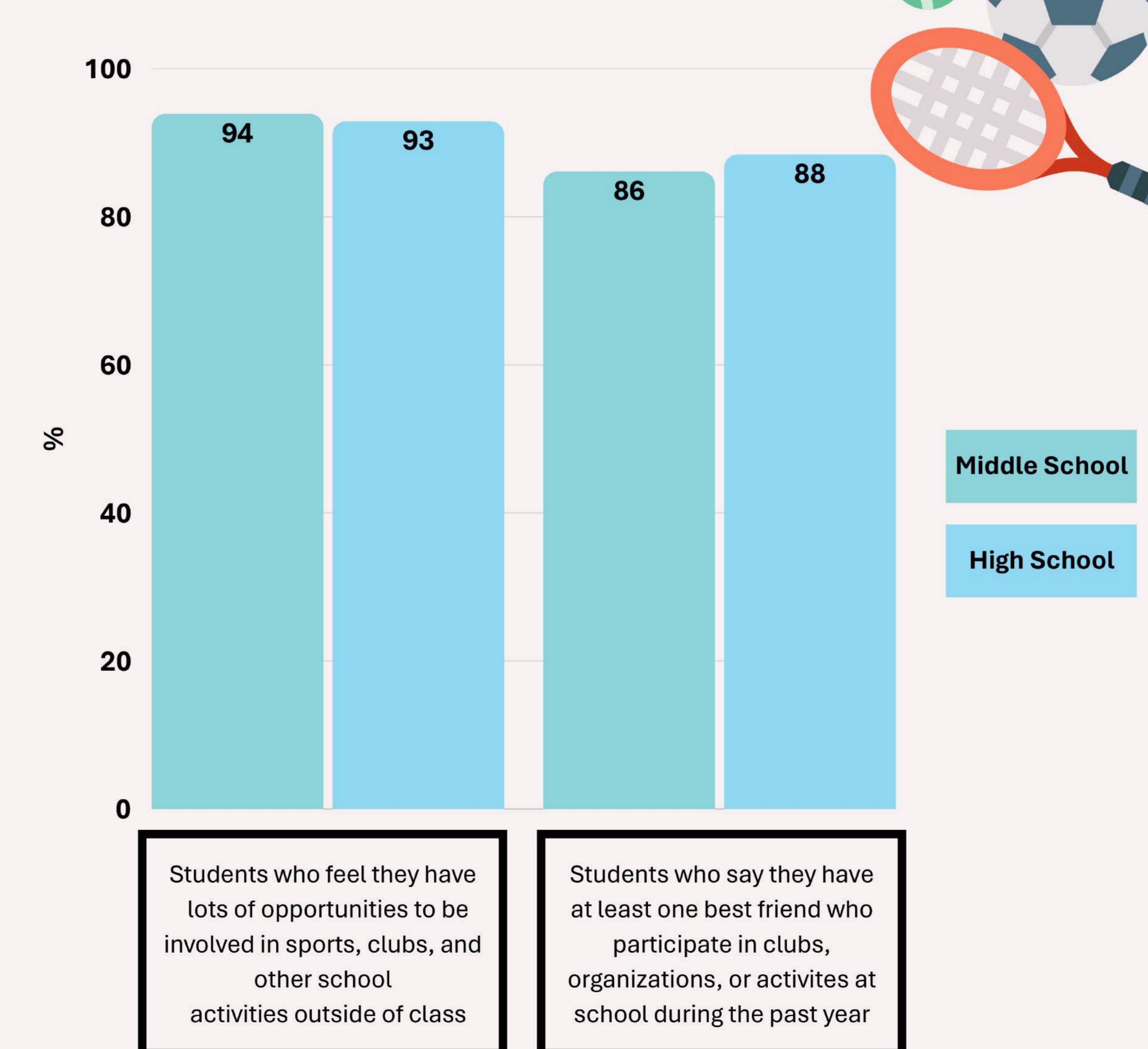
Students Retained in Grade ~ 2023-2024



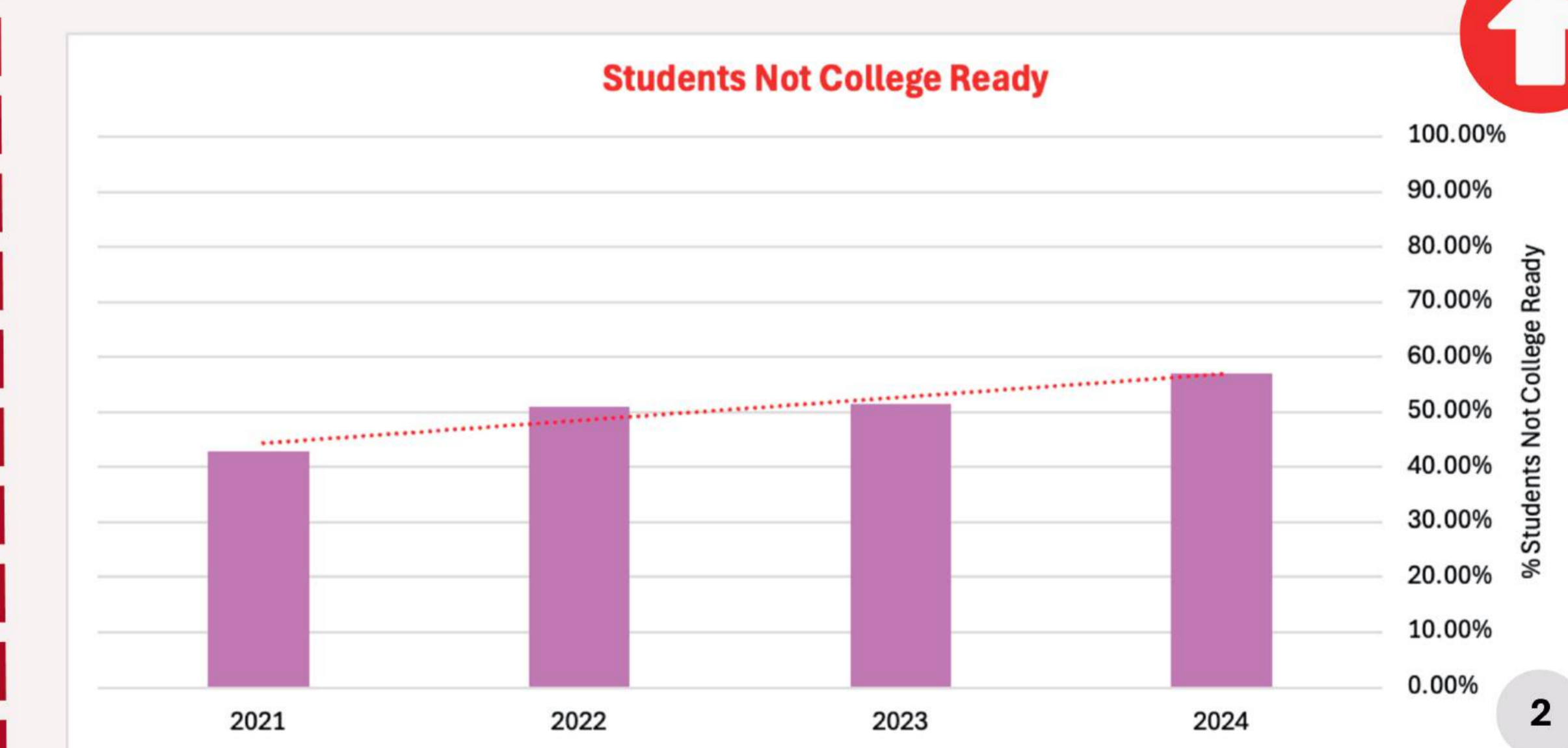
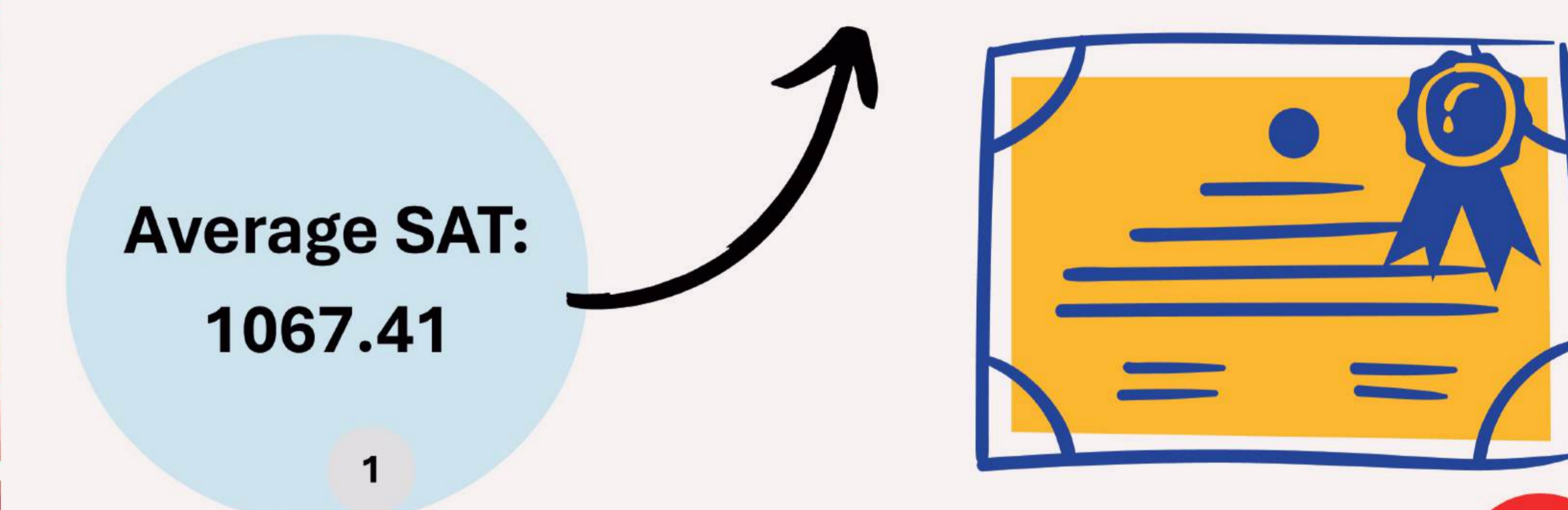
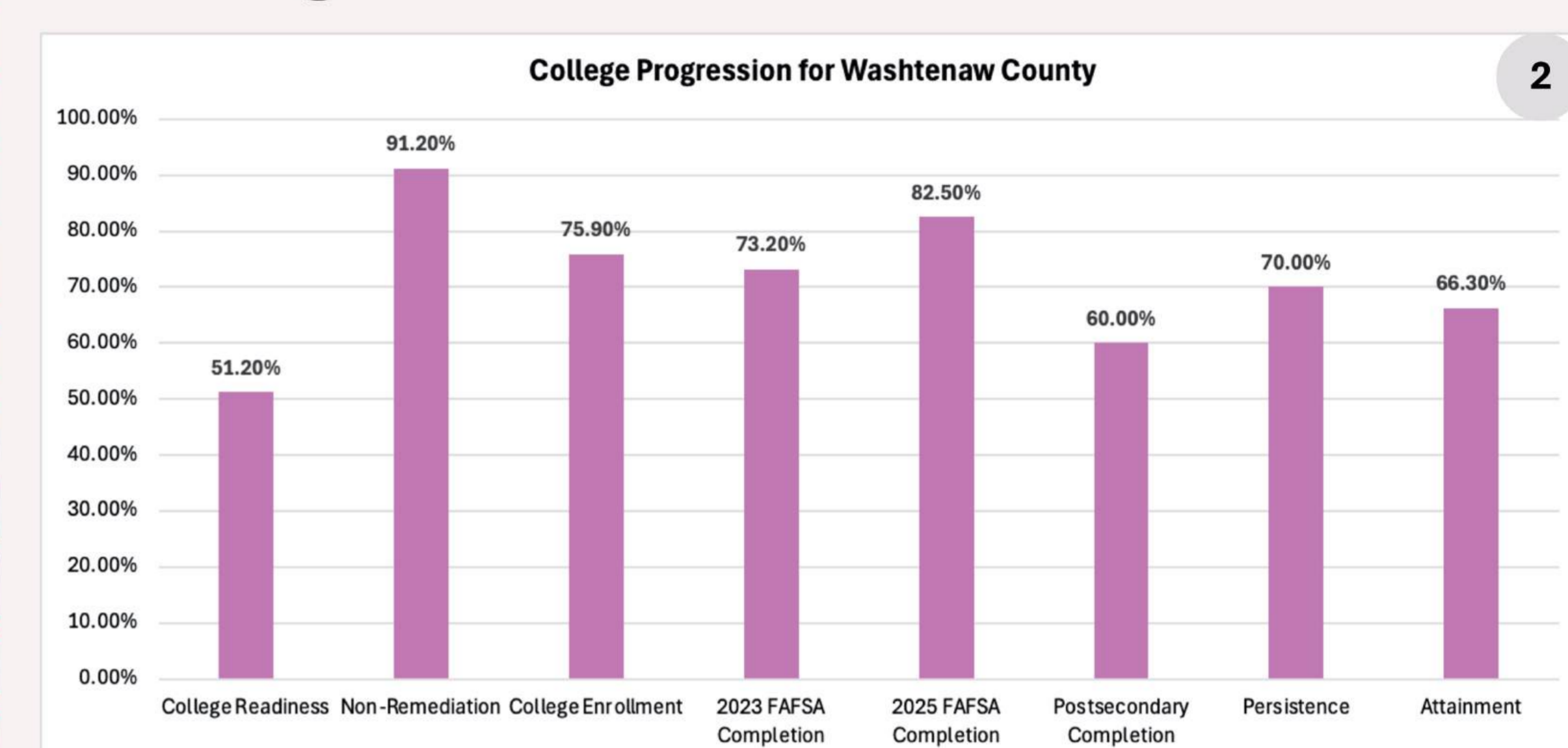

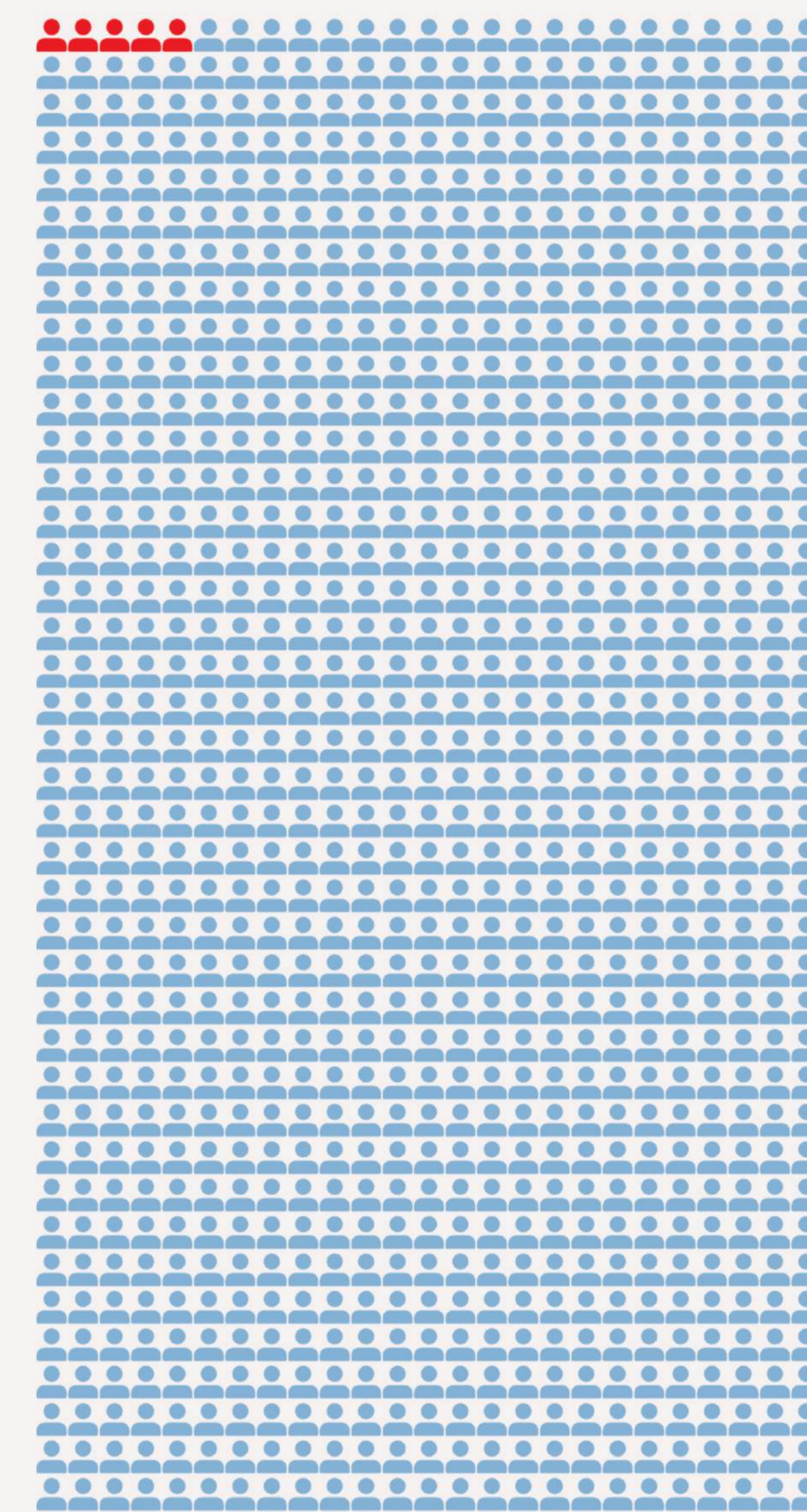

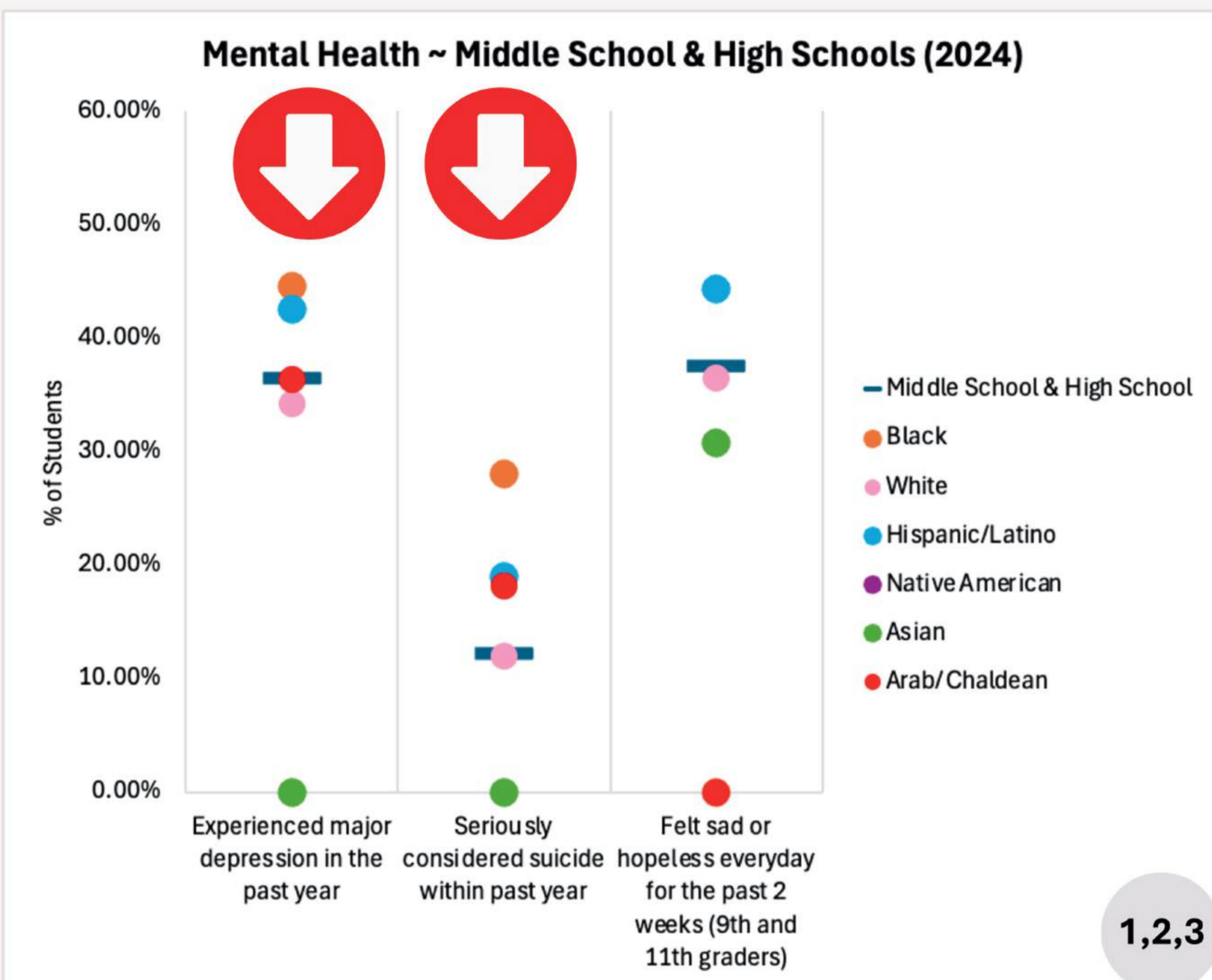
Number of victims of abuse from ages birth to 17 (Rate per 1,000 children) ~ 2023



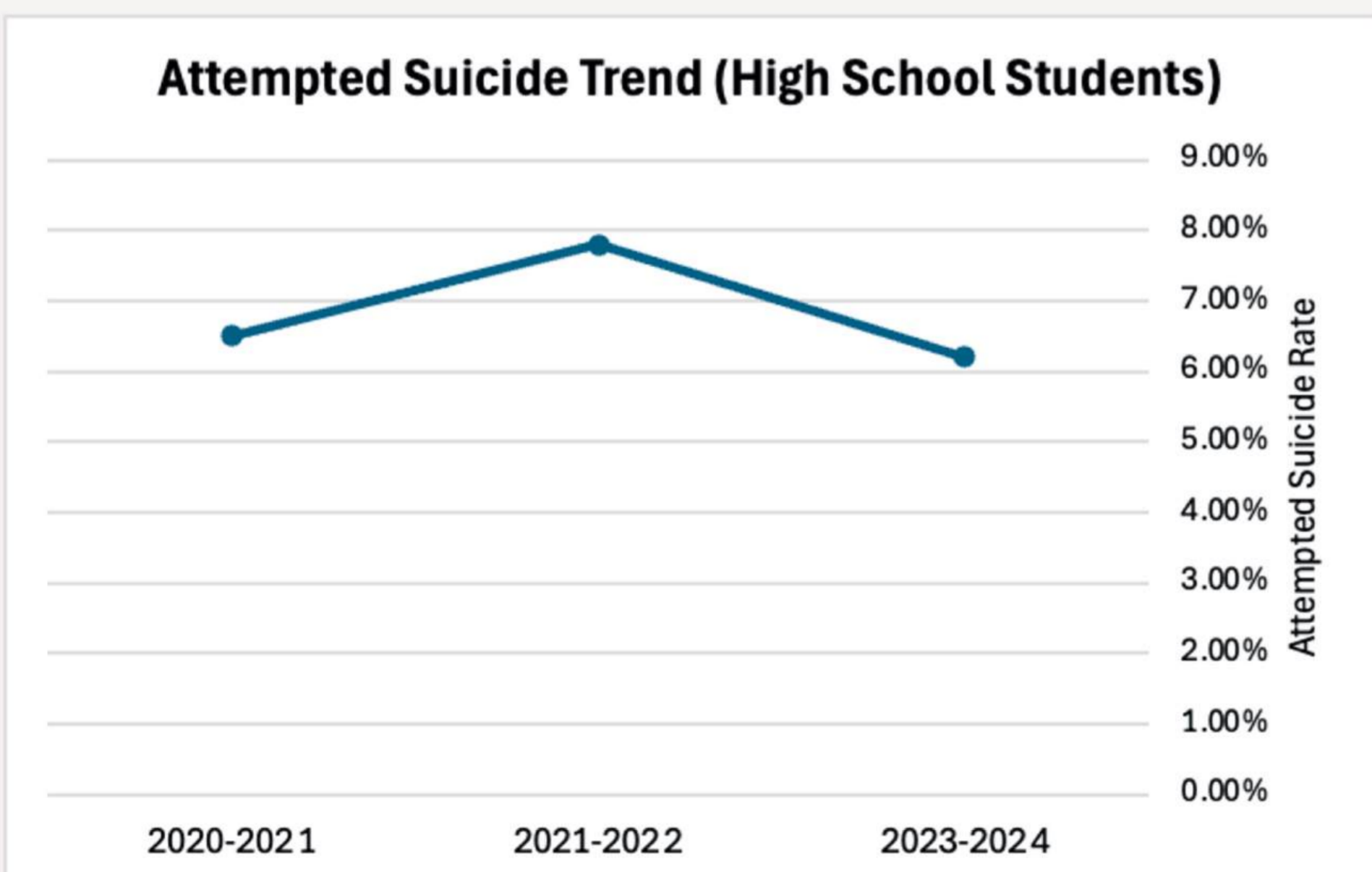
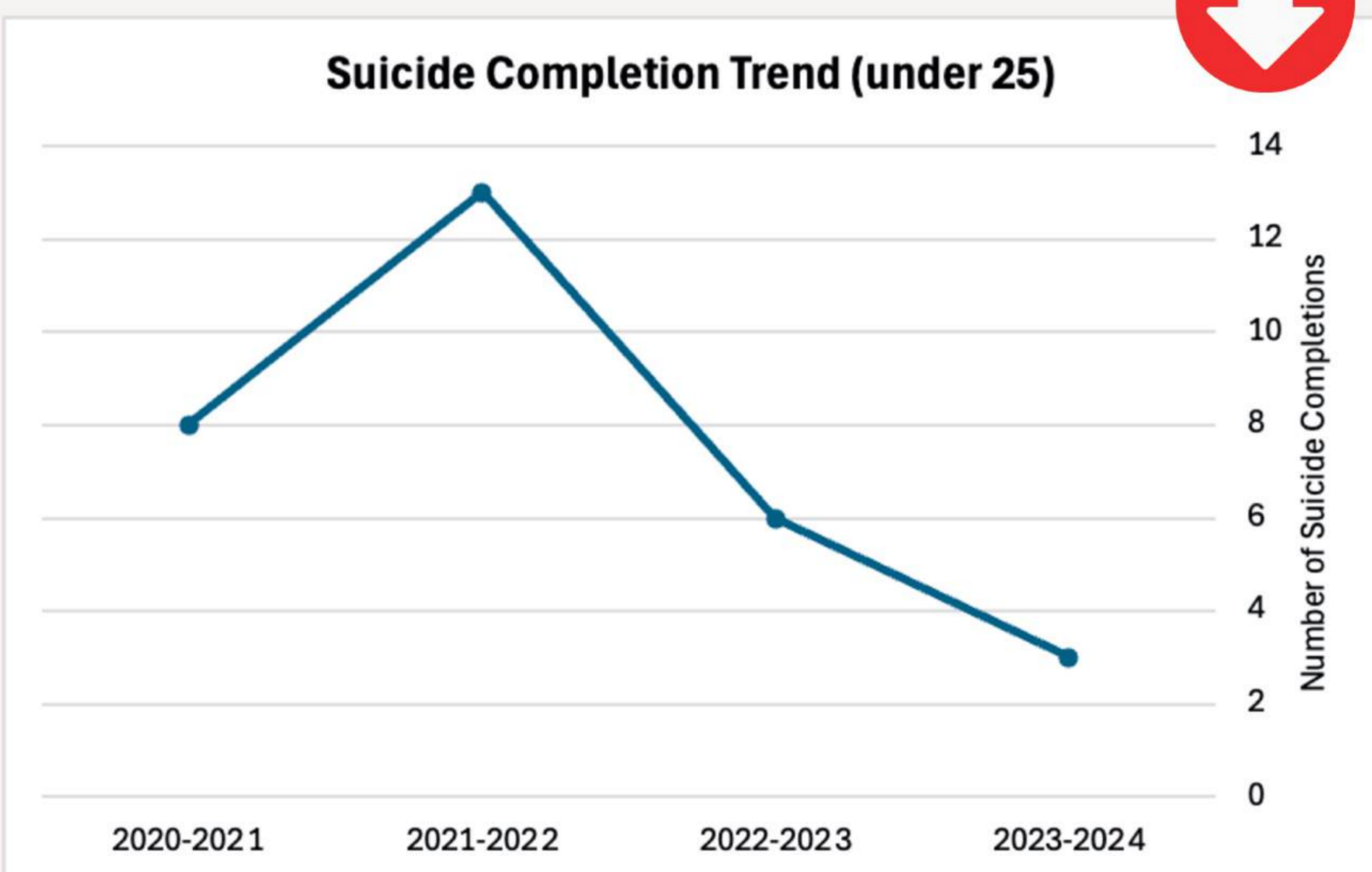

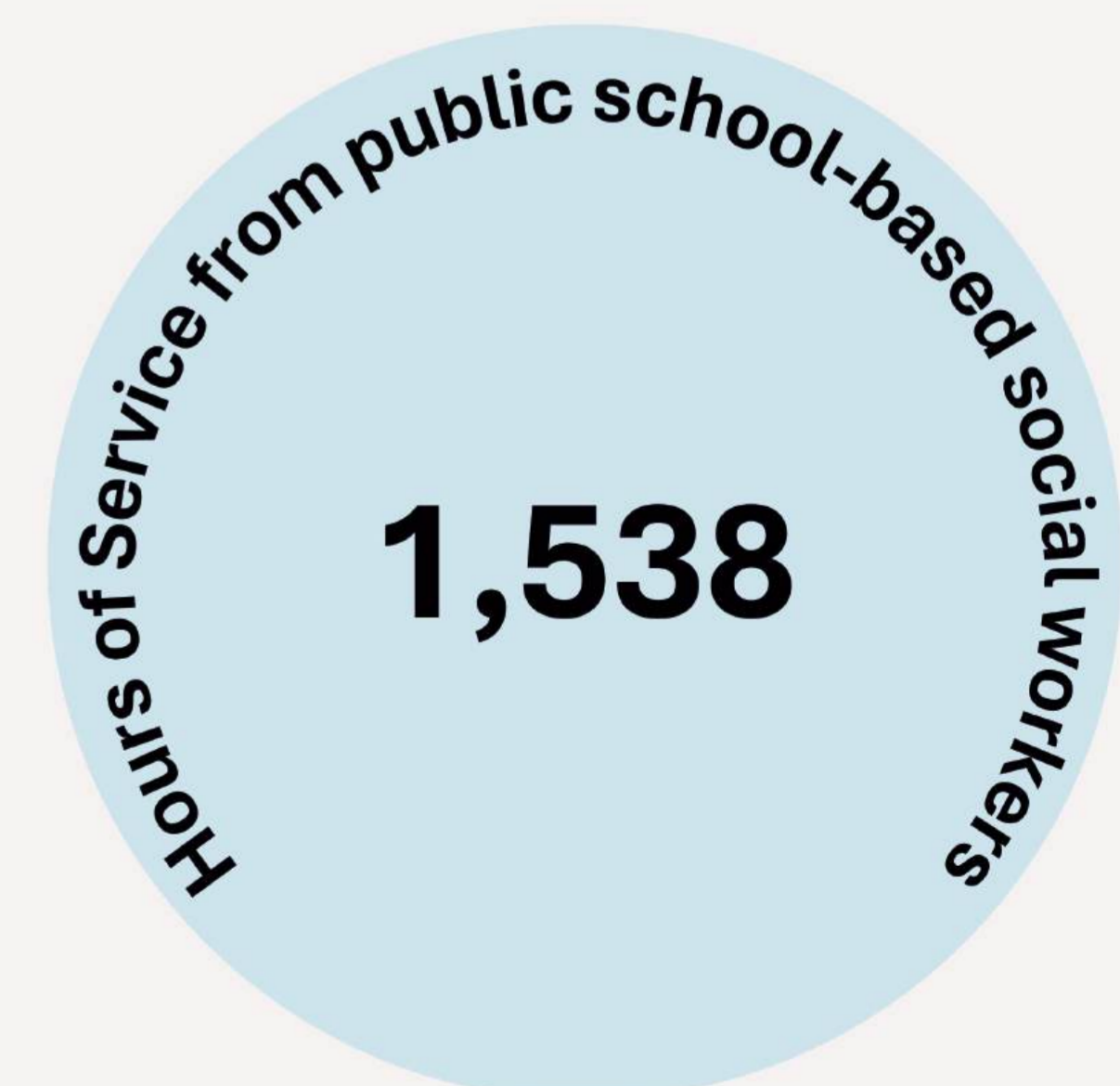


Designing mental health programs through mini grants destigmatizes mental illness while promoting well-being!



Washtenaw County Community Mental Health is a team of interdisciplinary mental health professionals that provide crisis intervention and additional support.

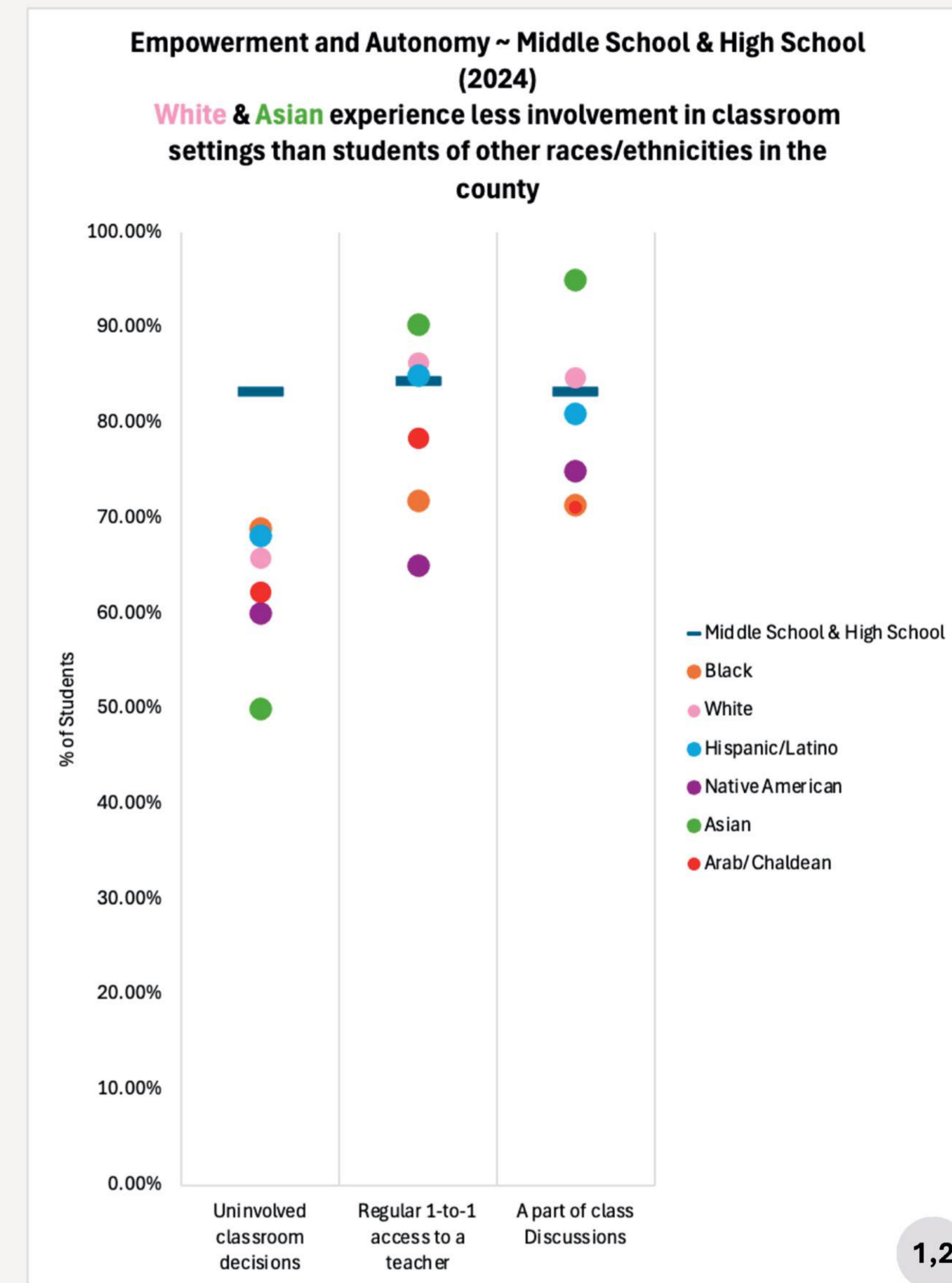
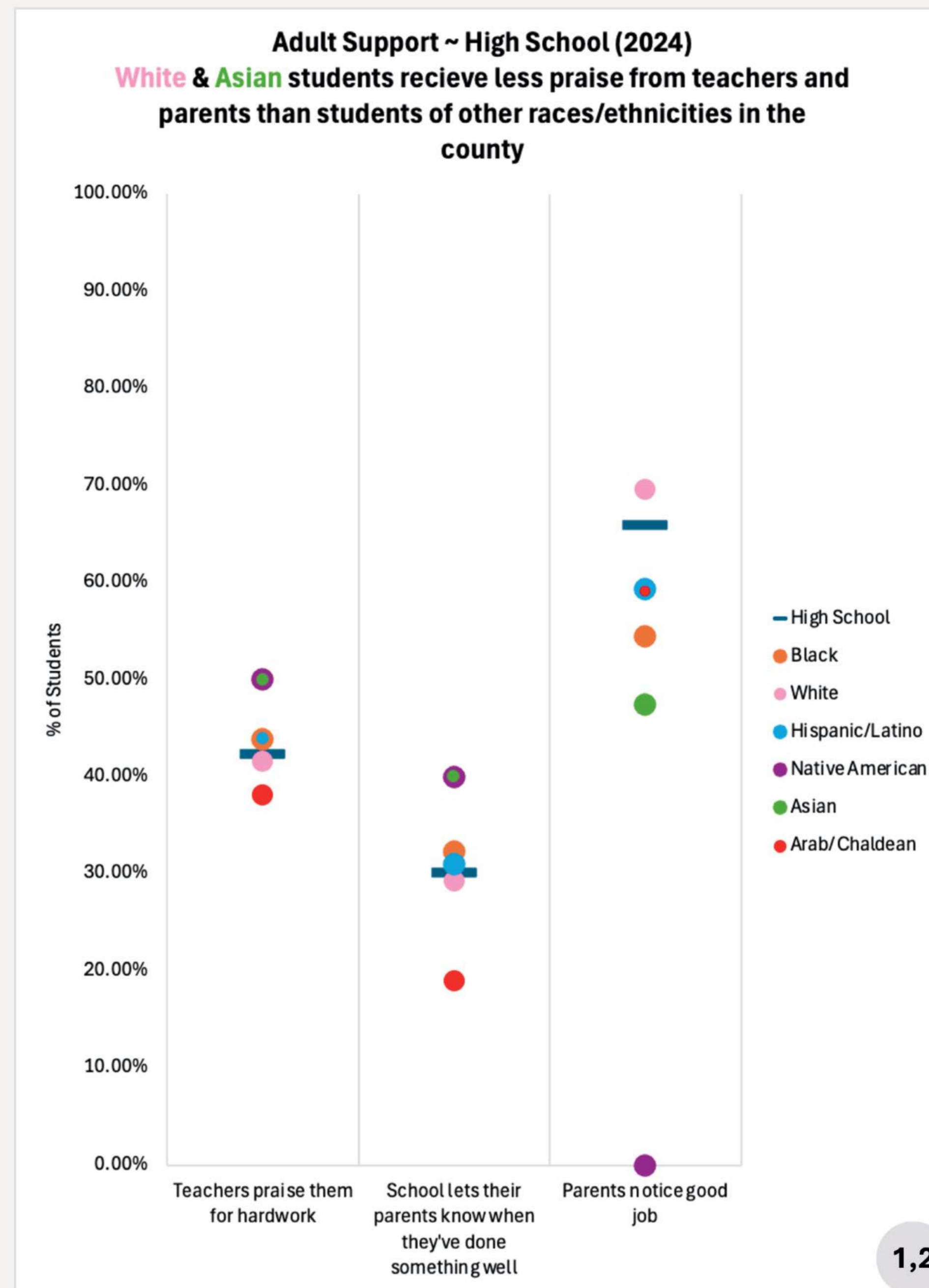
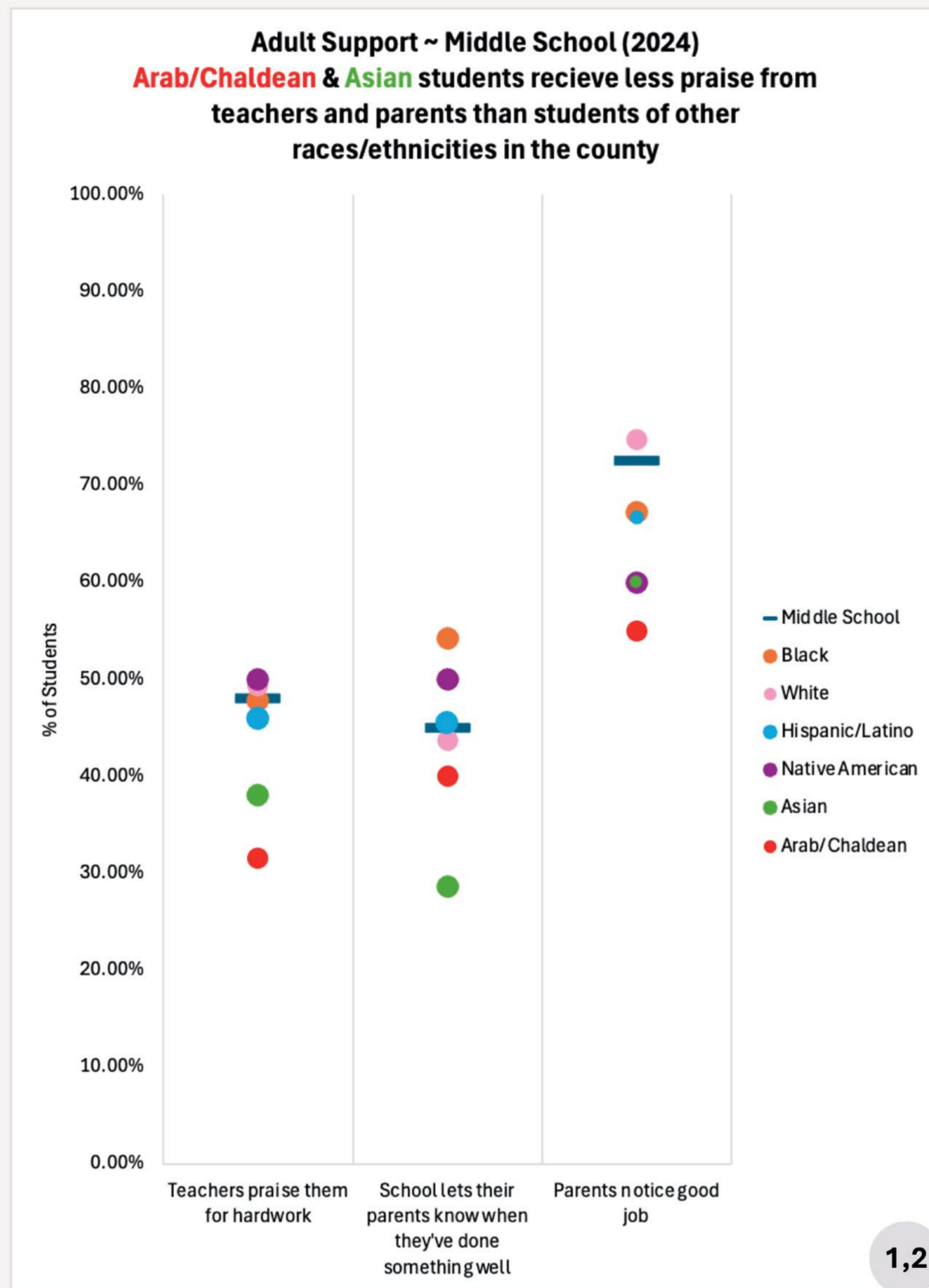
WCCMH utilizes assessments, medication reviews, and other services to improve wellbeing.

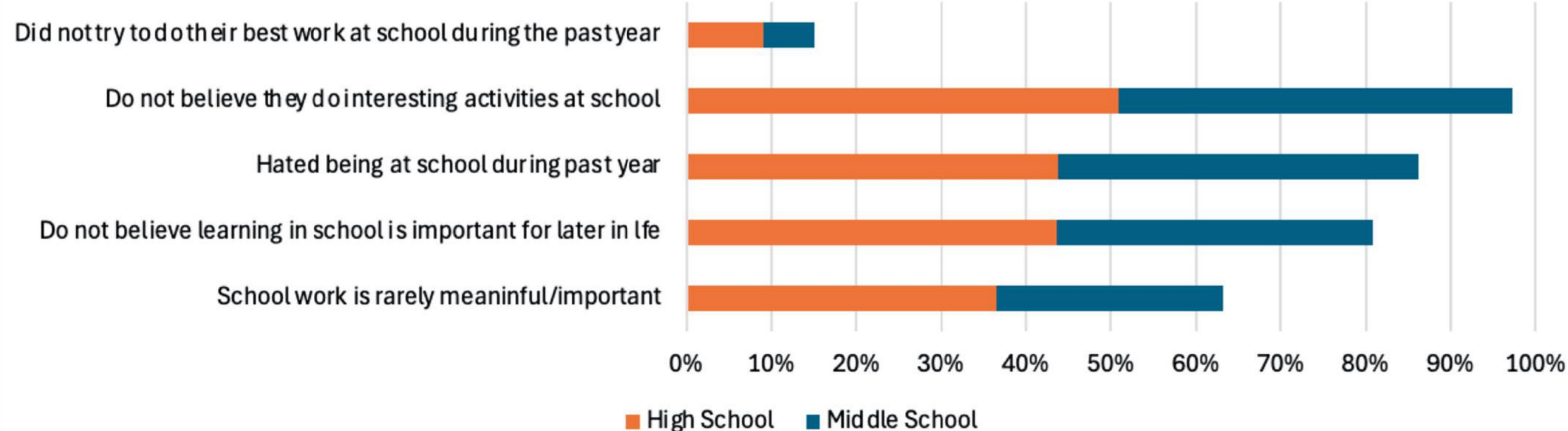

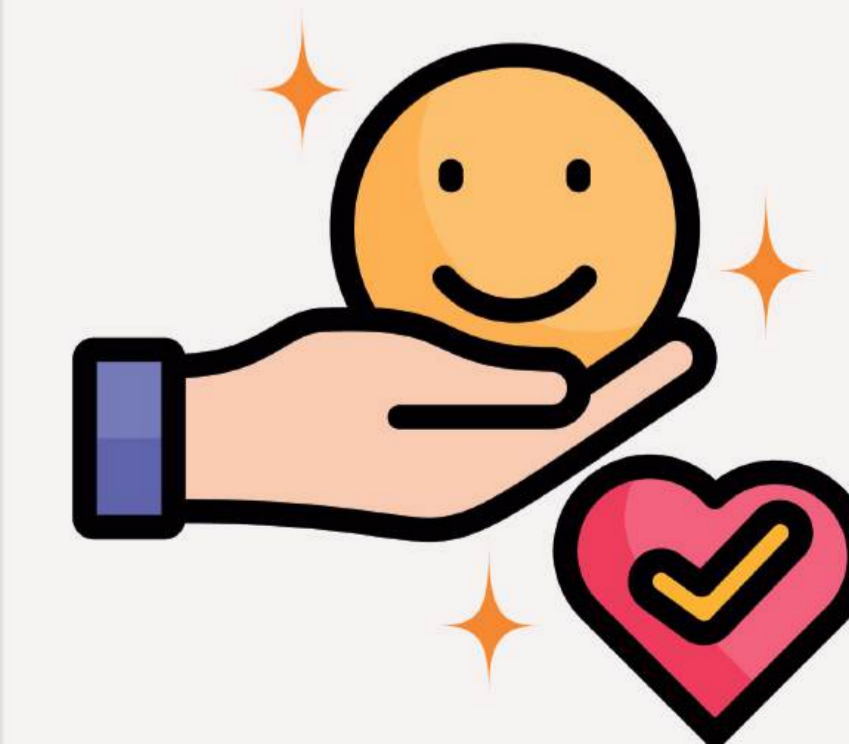
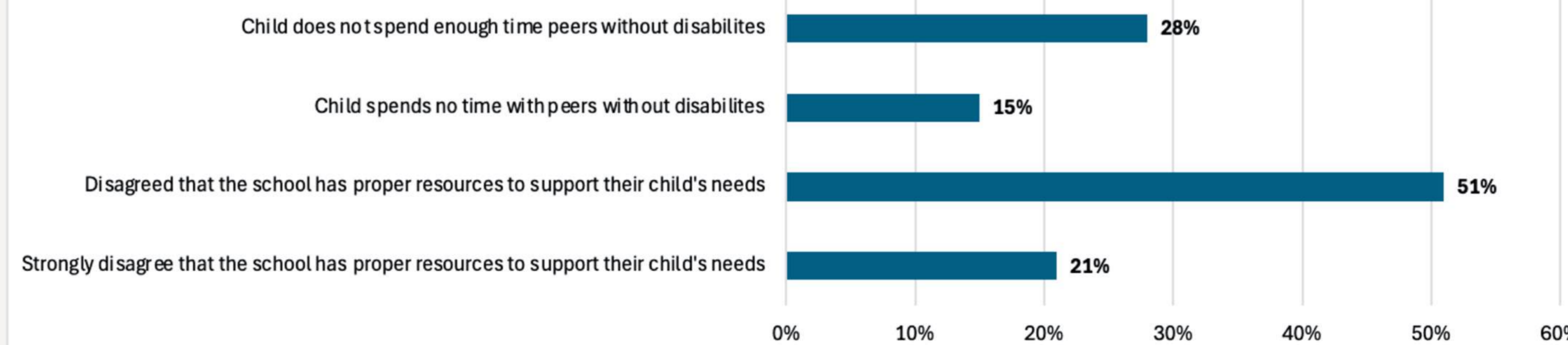
